The Boer Wat took place in South Africa. Seven thousand Canadians served to aid the British, from 1899 to 1902. World War 1, also called The Great War ran from 1914 to 1918. 65000 Canadians gave their lives and 172000 were wounded. We Remember these by learning about them from history (and

The Internet). Many of us learned about The Great War from Grandparents.

For many, the Second World War (1939 to 1945) is part of our living memory. I remember the German occupying forces in The Channel Islands . The islands were occupied from July 1940 to May 1945. (Yes, I am that old.) Close to thirty thousand Canadians died and more than 54000 were wounded.

I Remember as a young boy, going to the Cenotaph Service on Nov 11th. and feeling very sad because of all the people who died, especially my dad. My Mother told me, he was killed.

Many of us have hard memories too, which are stirred on November 11th.

Many younger people today, do not share that sense of loss. It is essential that we maintain the traditions of remembering so that the world never forgets.

Remembrance Day, November 11, has always been an important day for GGC and will continue to be. During the First and Second World Wars, Canadian Girl Guide members were active in supporting the nation's war effort, as well as helping children affected by war overseas.

Today, Girl Guide members continue to connect with members of Canada's military and veterans, both at home and while deployed, as well as welcome newcomers, and refugees in local communities. And each year, Girl Guides can be found at Remembrance Day ceremonies from coast to coast to coast.

Girl Guides of Canada members across Canada will continue to mark Remembrance Day with their units this year and it is part of our programming. Many units will participate in Remembrance Day events in their communities, including attending Remembrance Day parades and placing wreaths at local cenotaphs. Girl Guides of Canada also offers programming activities, including the Guiding Remembers Instant Meeting and the Canadian Women of Valour Instant Meeting.

I am aware that numerous Girl Guide units are signed up to attend Youth Night at the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa on November 9.

From our perspective, our priorities have not changed around Remembrance Day, and we will continue to focus on what is important - teaching youth to honour, show gratitude and respect for those that have served and continue to serve, but also to acknowledge our responsibility to work for the peace they fought to accomplish.

Illuminate Viam

I frequently get asked if Cadet Instructor Cadre (CIC) Officers (commonly referred as Cadet Officers) are real members of the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF). Although I carry CAF identification, I have a framed commission signed by the governor general and the ministry of defence, I wear a CAF uniform, attend CAF training courses, and a draw a monthly pay cheque from the Department of National Defence, the question of my validity seems to be always questioned or queried.

Officers of the Cadet Instructors Cadre (CIC) are members of the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) Reserve working as part of the Cadet Organizations Administration and Training Service (COATS). The CIC consists of approximately 5000 commissioned officers whose primary duty is the safety, supervision, administration, and training of over 50,000 cadets ages 12–18 in more than 1,000 corps and squadrons across Canada.

The role of the CAF is to defend Canada from threats to its security. Canada is more than just a land mass to defend, but it's made of much more, its people and their values. As a CIC officer I work with the youth of our society, most often the most vulnerable in means of those who need protection, guidance, and mentorship and provide these young people with the tools to become responsible members of our society in the future. As a CIC officer we train our cadets to become good Canadian citizens beyond their participation in the CCO.

Very seldom will you see CIC officers with campaign medals for service in far off places, as our battles are mainly fought sharing with the struggles of our youth of today. Mental health, drug addition, suicide prevention, gender identification, stress of school, loss of a loved one, serious illness, bullying, sexual assault, family social and income status, etc. are common issues CIC officers are faced with. Although we are not social works but, in most cases, we are the front lines of defence in the protection of the future of our country. The first 5 years of my 35 year career in the CAF, I did defend this country training aboard ships as a reservist of the Royal Canadian Navy, however the last 30 years I have served my country by being there with a cadet who receives a message their parent passed away, by being there explaining why a fellow cadet may look different now due to chemo treatments, by being there to inform children's aid when a cadet has confided in you of an assault at home, by being there to assist with grade 12 calculus, and just by being there to offer guidance to an eager individual. I live by the CIC motto "Illumiate Viam" (Illuminate the Way), and proudly serve by defending the youth of Canada, and I will continue to serve in the CAF as a CIC officer defending this country by being there to see its future grow.

We need to understand a few things before we can move forward and evolve:

- The Legion is a living breathing organization that is passed from one generation ro the next. None of us own it. We protect and maintain it to pass on to the next generation and so on.
- We need to groom Members early to take on various roles. Knowledge may be power, but sharing that knowledge has even greater power.
- Know and understand that over time, you will reach the extent of your leadership abilities and as a result, your branch will reach the extend of its potential. At this stage you should be either looking for opportunities above Branch level to improve yourself further, or adopting the role of Mentor to support the incoming leadership.
- Members should support their Executive and the Executive should support its Members. We must remember our main goal is the support of ALL Veterans and their families. the momenbt you let your personal feelings of an individual get in the way, you hinder your Branch's ability to provide that support. Remember that your Executive has been elected. You may or may not have voted for them, but the majority did. Respect that.
- Identify dtrengths among your Membership and use it. Our Membership comes from all walks of life and they often come with skills they would be happy to share. Take adavantage of that.
- Find teaching opportunities wherever you can and grooming Members to eventually take over key positions should start eaarly. Use every opportunity in the day to day ectivities to explain or demonstrate procedures. If you wait until that Member is elected often it is to late.
